MEETING SUMMARY REPORT

ATTENDEES: Representatives of 23 of 48 member schools and SNAC were in attendance. Thomas Rhymes, representing the administration, was also in attendance as a special guest. Please see attached attendance record for further details.

UPDATES:

- LBPSB Commitment-to-Success Plan 2018-2022 Consultation: the PC response, approved via e-Vote (Basecamp platform), was ratified; a copy is attached.
- **Student Success ad hoc subcommittee**: the Enhanced Programs recommendations to be submitted to Council, approved via e-Vote (Basecamp platform), was ratified; a copy is attached.
- **Student Success ad hoc subcommittee**: the Enhanced and Extended Learning Project Recommendation to be submitted to Council, approved via e-Vote (Basecamp platform), was ratified; a copy is attached.

NEW TOPICS:

- **Connie Held Award:** a brief overview was given of the award to be given at the 2018-2019 AGA; more details will be given in an email as well as a request for nominations.
- Parent Structures Ad hoc Subcommittee: a brief overview was given of the subcommittee that will look at this year's structure and make recommendations to the PC for the 2018-2019 structure; preliminary dates for the first meeting were polled. The meeting will be held on June 20. All PC members (Parent Reps and Alternates) are invited to attend.

VARIA:

- 922 LBPSB and 90 outside students wrote the Enrichment exam for high school; results should be received mid-June.
- For the 6th year, the annual Family Fun Run took place at Centennial Park on May 6, 2018 with over 400 participants; the event raised over \$1200 to support the LIFE program at Lindsay Place.

- Sheila Dunwoodie, teacher at Margaret Manson Elementary was recently awarded the Prime Minister's Award for Teaching Excellence in STEM.
- Our vocational students from VACC, PACC and PEC competed at this year's Vocational Olympics which were held at Place Bonaventure on May 3-4, 2018; 1400 elementary students had the opportunity to witness this competition where PACC won a Bronze medal in Pastry!
- Verdun Elementary students presented their video game at the Youth Fusion Festival held at the Olympic Stadium on May 4th and 5th.
- At the IMPACT game of May 5, 2018, two LBPSB students were awarded the Tony Licursi bursary in the amount of \$500: congratulations to Jessica De Filippo from John Rennie High School and Liam Mansfield from Beaconsfield High School; there was a good crowd of LBPSB families in attendance, and all ticket sales went to support the Pearson Education Foundation.
- On May 23, 2018, the Management Team of the LBPSB participated in the KAIROS Blanket Exercise, an activity designed to explore the relationship between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples in Canada; the objective was to sensitize the Management Team to our historical reality in relation to indigenous people (truth) and to encourage them to take small steps in their school to acknowledge that reality (reconciliation); the LBPSB Truth and Reconciliation Committee organized this event with First Nation facilitators.
- Marie Wahba, Assistant Director of Educational Services since 2013 and former principal of Sunshine Academy and vice-principal of Springdale Elementary, has been appointed the LBPSB Director of Educational Services; her involvement in the board's Deep Learning Initiative and her commitment to the implementation of the CEFL/DELF Certification are significant contributions to both ESD and the LBPSB as a whole.
- Kurt Binnie, the former Director of Information Technology and Education Commons at the University of Toronto, has been hired as the LBPSB Director of Technology and Innovation; his drive and his innovative spirit are welcome additions to the LBPSB community.

23/48 Member Schools Represented

The Parents' Committee has the following suggestions for the LBPSB Commitment-to-Success Plan 2018-2022 Consultation:

1. Direction1: Improve Achievement - Add an objective to increase the Overall Average

There should be some initiatives to increase the overall average. Some suggested indicators:

- Increasing the Board's average on the MEES Sec IV History exam by 3%
- Increasing the Board's average on the MEES Sec V French as a second language exam by 5%
- Increasing the Board's average on the MEES Sec V English exam by 5% The above are some suggestions and can be modified.
- 2. Direction1: Improve Achievement Study Skills

We suggest that students more uniformly be taught necessary study skills, including time management and organizational, beginning in grade 5.

3. Direction1: Improve Achievement - Personalized Learning Plans

We suggest that the LBPSB look into incorporating personalized learning plans into the educational process as early as grade 7, and capitalize on Fusion as a place where these plans can easily be updated and accessed by students and parents.

4. Direction1: Improve Achievement - Software Coding

We suggest that the LBPSB integrate formalized software coding Education as a part of the curriculum starting in elementary schools, including professional development for teachers. Many jurisdictions have developed a coding curriculum for elementary school, which can easily be used as reference.

5. Direction1: Improve Achievement - Summer School

We suggest that <u>all</u> students of all learning abilities have access to optional paid-by-parents summer school, both remedial and enhanced.

6. Direction1: Improve Achievement - Vocational Education

We suggest that the LBPSB adopt and further develop programs such as "The Circuit" across the Board's high schools, and that these programs be better promoted and advertised.

7. Direction1: Improve Achievement - Improve IEPs

There are currently no measures or indicators listed in this plan that allow for the tracking of success for students on modified programs. Ensuring that quality

Individualized Education Plans are set up for these students can play a significant role in both their level of success, as well as our ability to measure that success and progression.

We suggest the LBPSB prioritize and support the accurate creation, implementation, and reporting of IEPs. Success rates of students on modified programs need to be properly assessed, perhaps through staff and parental feedback.

8. Direction1: Improve Achievement - Increase Level of fluency in French

The LBPSB should increase the level of fluency in French by increasing participation in initiatives such as Langue Maternelle, DELF and Accent Quebec.

9. Direction 2: Ensure Wellness – Anxiety Management Workshops

Under the objective to strengthen healthy lifestyles and positive mental health, we propose adding the following strategy based on our results from the Tell Them From Me (TTFM) survey:

 Provide 'Anxiety Management' workshops. No baseline but a Target of 1 per grade per school year (from Grade 7 to Grade 11) and the success indicator would be the TTFM survey.

10. Direction 2: Ensure Wellness - Better Sleeping Habit Workshops

Under the objective to encourage learners to adopt a healthy and physically active lifestyle, we would like to propose adding the following based on observations from parents and teacher of the students:

• Provide 'Better Sleeping Habits' workshops. No baseline but a Target of 1 per grade per school year (from Kindergarten to Grade 11) and the success indicator would be overall observations by staff and parents.

11. Direction 2: Ensure Wellness – Parent Survey

To foster safe and caring relationships within the school, the community, and the digital environments.

Comment: If students are not able to complete the TTFM survey, then their level of feeling safe at school is not being measured. In addition, students with a handicap, social maladjustment or learning disability, may not be accurately completing the survey. Having parents participate in a Learning Bar, or other source survey, can give some additional input and insight.

We recommend the use of a parent survey to gather input as part of the school's safety portrait.

12. Direction 2: Ensure Wellness – Counter all forms of Hate and Racism

We recommend that the LBPSB start 'diversity' and 'inclusion' training initiatives that support and foster a more sensitive community by building social awareness of stereotypes, social inequalities, and unconscious bias.

TITLE: THE ENHANCED AND EXTENDED LEARNING PROJECT

Issue

Whereas despite the LBPSB having one of the highest graduation rates in the province, there is always room for improvement; and

Whereas 'graduating' is not a sufficient metric by which to determine achievement, nor does it guarantee students admission into their preferred post-secondary program; and

Whereas students have been shown to lose a not insignificant portion of their knowledge over the summer break, a phenomenon known as summer learning loss, summer setback, or summer slide; and

Whereas students should be free to improve their academic understanding with the goal of increasing their future grades and career opportunities, and be supported in those efforts;

Proposed Solution

We hereby request that <u>all</u> students of all learning abilities have access to optional paidby-parents summer school, both remedial and enhanced.

As we take a look at our neighbours to the South:

"... As the final months of the 2016-17 school year unfold, the nation's 4 million 9th graders—the Class of 2020—are entering the make-it-or-break-it final weeks of their first year of high school. And GradNation—the national campaign by America's Promise Alliance to increase graduation rates to 90 percent by 2020—is entering its make-it-or-break-it years.

In addition to these numerical goals, our students also face additional competition from foreign and out of province students in higher education.

So in addition to a new goal to increase the graduation rate, we also now require a qualitative factor.

In the United States some states have recognised that some of the major issues have to do with income disparity. The second is what is referred to as the summer learning loss, summer setback or summer slide.

Based on the Brookings study referenced above, they found that students lost an average of about 20-30 percent over the summer. When socio-economic factors are included, a gap starts to develop .While we do not have adverse socio economic factors as exists in the US, they do exist in our province and as such they present an impediment to our primary goals.

The solution is to use existing tools and facilities to run within our summer school project. In my research there are multiple programs that I researched.

The Summer School Project

Common suggestions include blending academic learning with hands-on or recreational activities, professionalizing summer school staff, and forming partnerships with community organizations to leverage resources (cost as much as \$1500 per student).

The Reading and Math Based Programs

READS for Summer Learning. In READS, which has been iteratively modified over several randomized trials, students receive eight books in the mail over the summer that are matched to their reading level and interests. Along with each book, students receive a tri-fold paper that leads them through a pre-reading activity and a post-reading comprehension check. Students are asked to mail the postage-prepaid tri-fold back; families receive reminders when tri-folds are not returned. (Cost as much as \$700 per student)

While investing in extensive school-based summer options may be infeasible, it may be cost-effective and strategic for School boards to begin to offer targeted out-of-school interventions to the students most at risk of backsliding. (This is where fusion can track certain metrics).

Where is summer learning successful

The new term for Summer school is Summer Learning and some states have new names to change the stigma. In California it is called expanded learning enhances student success. Signed into law in California, in 2014, this program focuses existing resources on summer and year-round programs; requires data-driven local quality improvement plans; leverages state data systems to track outcomes; and streamlines program administration. Implementation is supported by new quality standards from the California Afterschool Network.

MASSACHUSETTS: After-School and Out-of-School Time (ASOST) Quality Enhancement Grant Program

Since 2011, the ASOST program has provided grants to enhance afterschool and summer learning programs in areas such as professional development and STEM; address barriers to participation and expand summer learning programs specifically. The program was appropriated \$1.7M in 2014. (N.B.: This is the number one state in education in the US.)

Summary

As a parent in the English sector, I do not have the luxury of taking anything for granted in terms of my children's education. There is an extra burden in all students in the province; for anglophones, it is to achieve a mandatory proficiency in French and for francophones it is not mandatory to achieve an English proficiency. We live in a world where both are required, and in addition we need to produce a competitive educated population. Quebec is begging to get graduation rates to 85% in 2030, the US is looking to 90% in 2 years. We as parents may not have time left.

Our solution identifies goals, and the reasons for this radical solution: Summer School and its new term: Enhanced and Extended Learning.
